
WEST LEIGH: When teacher Bismark Antwi arrived at St Alban's C of E Primary School in West Leigh, he was shocked.

In his home country, Ghana, such highquality facilities are available only to university students, rather than four to 11-yearolds. The 35-year-old came to Britain for a week as part of an exchange organised by our Inter-Diocesan West Africa Link (IDWAL) with Ghana.

St Alban's headteacher Alice Wood also visited Bismark's school - St Andrew's in Asesewa, in the Diocese of Koforidua as part of the swap.

Bismark, who normally teaches maths, English and environmental studies to 12-15 year olds, said: "The facilities here are excellent, and are comparable to the facilities at one of our universities.

"The children also ask a lot of questions, and they are also neat and obedient. I've been teaching them about the geography and culture of Ghana using a big map and some craft items from Ghana."

Mrs Wood, who went to Ghana for 12 days with a group from Hayling Island, could vouch for Bismark's assessment.

"At his school, there was no running water and three children didn't have notebooks or pens," she said. "Then we went to Takrose, where conditions were even worse.

"They couldn't afford a teacher for the younger pupils. The school was a mud hut with a corrugated iron roof and no walls. And there was nothing to stimulate the children's imagination. But the children were very keen to learn." She hopes St Alban's can help

fundraise for the school at Takrose. SANDOWN: Staff and governors at

The team from the Office for Standards in Education (Ofsted) said standards were good, and leadership and management were very good at the Grove Road school. The report also praised pupils' attitudes and behaviour and found the teaching and assessment was good. The diocesan

Headteacher Diane Christopher said: "I am thrilled with the outcome of our latest Ofsted inspection. The diocesan inspection, which was carried out simultaneously, was equally glowing and there were no recommendations for improvements."
