The garden was designed by the school's Year 8 citizenship group who enlisted the help of Ryde street wardens Gill Mulcahy and Harry Dea.

It is a circular reflection area where pupils can relax and spend time in quiet.

That meant they qualified for the southern England finals in which they competed against teams from across Hampshire, Dorset and Sussex.

Their second place in the mixed stroke relay and third place in the freestyle relay then meant they qualified for the national finals.

Matthew Dampier, PE co-ordinator, said: "Our school does not have its own swimming pool, so the boys were at a disadvantage, but worked really hard, and it was wonderful to see them achieve such excellent results."

They will travel to Sheffield for the event on June 18.

SHANKLIN: The headteacher of Shanklin C of E Primary School, David Kitching, will attend an international conference of heads in South Africa in July.

He is one of 10 delegates from the UK, invited by the National Association of Head Teachers.

The conference will focus on the idea of 'Übuntu' - an African concept described by Archbishop Desmond Tutu as "the essence of being human".

Pupils will design an embroidered square for a peace quilt that will be put together from contributions from across the world and displayed during the Cape Town conference.
