# All welcome for office open day

THERE was a palpable sense of excitement as our diocesan staff explored their new offices for the first time.

After months of preparations and weeks of packing, they transferred to their new base at the start of August. It was the first time our diocesan staff had all been based in the same location.

The modern office in Peninsular House, just off the M275, has many features that help to improve the working environment for staff. The building is open-plan, air-conditioned, more

secure and has impeccable environmental credentials. It includes a staff room, large meeting room, proper reception, decent storage facilities, and a bike shed and shower. Staff have direct-dial phone numbers and voice mail for the first time, as well as new, easy-to-remember e-mail addresses, up-to-date computer technology and networked photocopying facilities.

The bishop visited between chemotherapy treatments to bless the new office. He left a large, carved wooden cross from the Carpathian Mountains, which was presented to him by Polish Lutherans, and a crozier made from wood from the Far East.

Both are now on display in the reception area.

And worshippers and others from across our diocese will be given a chance to see the new office for themselves. An open day will be held on September 28, from 9am-7pm, when anyone can pop in and be given a guided tour.

Bishop Kenneth said: "The new premises are eye-catching in every sense. Everyone will be working on the same floor, with separate rooms for the various team leaders. I was really impressed by what I saw.

"Andrew Robinson has done a splendid job in setting up the arrangements that have led us to where we are now. This all means we are in for a much more creative and collaborative time!"

The catalyst for the move was the cathedral's vision to create new education, music and community facilities in Cathedral House, which it owns. Our Bishop's Council agreed that our diocese should buy office facilities so that staff who previously worked in separate places could work together.

Peninsular House, near the cross-channel ferry port, was bought jointly by our diocese and Portsmouth Housing Association – PHA has the top three floors and our diocese has the bottom two. The ground floor will be rented out to provide our diocese with a regular income.

Deputy diocesan secretary Andrew Robinson said: "Apart from the financial benefits of our new offices, the driving force behind this move has been to provide a modern, comfortable environment for our staff where they can work together more effectively. Already we are seeing the benefits of staff being able to co-ordinate ideas across what used to be separate Boards."

The office move coincided with our new diocesan structures, which were agreed by diocesan synod in June, and are explained on pages 8-9. Diocesan staff will work in one of four sections – Mission and Resources, Mission and Education, Mission and Discipleship or Mission and Society.

Every effort will be made to provide transport for those from the Isle of Wight attending meetings in Peninsular House.

## Priest now at helm of counselling service

THE counselling service at a Portsmouth church has a new person at the helm.

The Rev Dr John Preston has taken over from Jackie Brookfield as the leader of the All Saints' Counselling Service. John spent almost 40 years as a parish priest and is a former healing adviser for Winchester diocese. He is an accredited psychosexual therapist and has been working in the NHS and as a counsellor for a major local employer since retiring from stipendiary ministry.

Jackie, a Reader from the Bishop's Waltham deanery, launched her vision for a church-based counselling service in 1995, encouraged and

supported by the vicar, the Rev Len Fox.

Since then, hundreds of people from across our diocese -

and those of John Preston other faiths and no faith - have been helped by qualified, committed Christians. Many of those counselled were facing grief and loss, depression or low self-esteem, anger, sexual confusion or relationship difficulties.

John said: "I see counselling as a very important part of the Church's ministry of bringing healing and wholeness to all. This service makes counselling available to people who wouldn't otherwise have access to it. Each client pays according to ability."
