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
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**GOSPORT:** Families from St Thomas the Apostle Church, Elson, decided to revive the ancient sport of crabbing for a summer fun day.

FROXFIELD: Ronald Graham-Clarke only started editing his parish magazine temporarily but 31 years later, he was still in the hotseat.

He's now stepping down after more than three decades editing Froxfield and Privett Parish Magazine, which serves the two parishes near Petersfield

Ronald and his wife Anne were asked to take over temporarily in 1977 when a new vicar decided not to edit the magazine, as his predecessor had done.

Their role has also involved producing an annual parish directory of village contacts.

Ronald said, "Anne and I have decided to hand over the editorship while we are both in reasonably good health. I am now 80 while our eldest grandchild is at university.'

#### **RYDE:** Bishop Lovett C the school of E Middle School followed an outstanding Ofsted report with praise from church school inspectors, who also called it "outstanding"

Its headteacher and governors were praised for their vision, commitment and dedication to maintaining and developing the Christian ethos. Its 380 pupils were praised for their team spirit, being mutually caring, supportive and respectful to all.

The report said the excellent leadership and management skills of the headteacher were transmitted throughout its staff and pupils. Their

spiritual, moral, social and cultural development was outstanding, and pupils were encouraged to develop their readiness for life beyond school.

TITCHFIELD COM-MON: The headteacher of St John the Baptist C of E Primary School has made another trip to China.

Last year the school established a link with Sanshengxiang Primary

School in Sichuan province in south-west China. St John's head April Owen-Jones became the first westerner to visit.

This year she returned, just before the major earthquake that hit the area. The school didn't suffer any damage during from the quake, but was forced to evacuate a few days later following warnings of fur-

Mrs Owen-Jones was

presented with a book for her pupils, in which the Chinese children had included letters, drawings and photographs about their activities in school. She also helped teach English to the children's parents so they could help foreign tourists expected in China for the Olympics last month.

 Ofsted inspectors also praised improvements at the school over the past two years. They said there had been "good improvements in pupils' achievements" and that the clear direction of Mrs Owen-Jones had helped the school to improve.
